Sample of the title of a talk: (Auroville, India, January 2012)

#### **Global Communication: Cosmos, Man, Words and World Cultures**

1. <u>Communication</u>: Latin: "munus" obligation, "unus" = one, we "must" communicate.

2. Cosmos: Greek: order, beauty, jewel

3. <u>Universe</u>: Latin "universus", lit. turned into one, whole, one song / Sanskrit "Sarva", "sarvam", perfect, everything, the totality / Chinese: "yü-chou", space/time (orig. roof, house)

4. <u>Man</u>: Chinese/Sanskrit: the one that thinks and feels / Japanese: The spirit within / Russian: The one who has eternity on his forehead / Bantu, Africa: the Gods, the ancestors, the living. Greek: anthropos-looking above, searching / Arabic, Persian, Turkish: friendship, community / Hebrew: breath, soul, desire

5. <u>Culture</u>: Latin: cultura, agriculture, see: cult. Latin colere: to till the ground / Sanskrit: Sa.nskriti: (kriti- creation) well made, well structured / Tamil: panbaadu- the maturity of the way. Arabic: salafiya, root: salafa: to go forward / Chinese: orig. flower; pattern, process, to go forward / Japanese: bunka: ka- to change, to develop / Persian: farhang- abundance, plenty, unlimited thinking

A sample of how to "teach" grammar in a holistic way:

**Grammar packed in Wisdom:** I have taught English grammar using different cultures: e.g. Omar Khayyam, the **Adverb:** 

I am a mirror and whoever speaks of me, nicely or badly, he always speaks about himself"

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### **Present Perfect**:

Monks, there never has been a human being who has not formerly been your father or your mother, your brother or your sister... Buddha

Many years ago, when I still lived in Egypt (1973-80), I came across a fascinating book about the meaning and importance of fairy tales by Bruno Bettelheim: "**The Use of Enchantment.**"

In the beginning of his book, the author gave his idea of a good story:

"For a story to hold the child's attention, it must **entertain** him and

arouse his curiosity. But to enrich his life, it must stimulate his imagination, help him to develop his intellect and to clarify his emotions; be attuned to his anxieties and aspirations, give full recognition to his difficulties, while at the same time suggesting solutions to the problems which perturb him.

In short, it must at one and the same time relate to all aspects of his personality and this without ever belittling but, on the contrary, giving full credence to the seriousness of the child's predicaments, while simultaneously promoting confidence in himself and in his future."

Bettelheim here described, what was to my mind, the perfect lesson arranged by an extraordinary teacher. I have merely to change the word "story" for "lesson". Is it not self-evident?

- 1. The lesson must hold the child's attention
- 2. The lesson must entertain him
- 3. The lesson must stimulate him
- 4. The lesson must clarify his emotions
- 5. The lesson must be attuned to his anxieties and aspirations
- 6. The lesson must give full recognition to his difficulties
- 7. The lesson must give solutions to the problems, which perturb him
- 8. The lesson must give confidence in himself now and in his future
- 9. The lesson must relate to all aspects of the personality

Let us, please, not forget that education means **encouragement** (Latin: cor= heart) and "setting an example".

If we want to survive, we have to study other cultures intensively; but only to study them will not be enough. We have to **love** them, even to identify with them. By loving them and by identifying with them, we will integrate them within ourselves.

Only then are we one with them:

- "Vasudaiva kutumbkam" = this world is one family, **India**
- "All under Heaven one family", China
- "Tauheed": God is one, humankind is one, Arabic.
- "You are all one in Jesus Christ", Christianity
- "Consider humankind as one", Jainism, India
- "This world is one big nest", Shinto, Japan
- Togetherness, Ubuntu, Africa

Incidentally: "**humankind**" means "related": kind-kin and kindred = related, and we should be **kind** to each other. Interesting?

Since I have worked "all" my life with the **youth**, I would like to share the following "poem" with you, by the Swiss philosopher and musician Albert Schweitzer:

#### Youth

"Youth is not a specific period of life, Youth is an attitude of mind, youth is the energy of the will; it is the originator of imagination, of the strength of emotions, of the victory of courage over cowardice, of the triumph of adventurism over laziness. No one grows old, because he has spent a couple of years. One only grows old when one has discarded one's own ideals and visions. In the course of one's life our skin gets wrinkled, but with the rejection of enthusiasm our soul withers away. You are as young as your optimism and faith, as old as your doubts, as young as your self-esteem, as old as your pessimism. As long as the ideas of beauty, joy, courage and grandour can reach your heart, so long you will be young."
